# **Course Description:**

The English II course is designed to promote essential literacy, discourse and thinking skills required for students to acquire new information independently as lifelong learners. Throughout this course students will gain proficiency through multiple opportunities to expand their academic vocabulary and closely analyze literature texts, informational texts and multimedia texts presented in a variety of formats. Critical thinking and the ability to independently pursue and acquire information will be taught through text, speech, media and writing analysis. Students will work collaboratively with their teachers, peers and educational community to develop clear communication skills in both writing and verbal discourse. Students will produce multiple pieces of writing for a variety of purposes and will practice presenting and defending their ideas verbally. Students will maintain a print/ electronic portfolio which contains work samples and reflections of their growth as learners and will follow them to the next grade-level. English Language Arts II is a required course for tenth grade students.

#### Course Outline:

Each unit of study is 13-21 class sessions. Units center around an essential question that students will ask themselves as they read various fiction and nonfiction texts. Unit dates are subject to change.

Unit 1: The Persistence of Memories August 21, 2023-October 11, 2023

How does the past impact the future?

Unit 2: The Power of Communication October 12, 2023-January 12, 2024

Why do words matter?

Unit 3: The Ties that Bind January 16, 2024-February 29, 2024

Unit 4: Exploring Literary Worlds March 1, 2024-April 12, 2024

How does the chosen novel challenge societal norms and inspire personal transformation?

Unit 5: Chopped, Stirred, and Blended April 13, 2024-End of Year

What are the ingredients of culture?
