take it lightly. Hazelwood West has played a huge role in building me as a leader. From engaging in group projects to being the captain of my




basketball team and captain of my volleyball team, it's given me a chance to learn from people and lead others."

Community Family Coalition Supporting HSD Families

The Hazelwood School District is creating the Community Family Coalition to provide support to families of students facing school challenges, such as bullying and fighting. This coalition is the result of several community members wanting to be more directly involved with helping students and their families.

This coalition directly ties into two of HSD's strategic plan objectives: Goal 2, differentiate and expand resources and services for students; and Goal 5, increase parent and community engagement.

"We are grateful for the community's support," said Dr. Nettie Collins-Hart, Superintendent of the Hazelwood School District. "When students are not in school, they are a part of this community, so having partners in the community serving as role models for our students and assisting their families is important."

There are three main components of the coalition's focus: Lunch Bunch, parent support conferences, and POSITIVE PRESENCE community school walks.

During Lunch Bunch, students with long-term suspensions meet with a coalition member at their home school during lunchtime.

While an HSD staff member will be present, this will provide students with an opportunity to discuss challenges with a coalition member and reduce the suspension.

In addition, the parent support conferences will serve as an opportunity for parents to discuss any challenges they are facing with a coalition member. Participation in the parent support conference will also reduce a student's suspension.

Lastly, the POSITIVE PRESENCE community school walks are designed to increase the visibility of our community leaders within our schools and show support for all of our students. During these school walks, coalition members' presence will help students feel seen by positive role models in the community, and it will also serve as a feedback loop in the community to share the many good things they see happening in our schools.

"Our students have talent, grit, and a hunger to learn," explained Derrick Elmore, JAG Specialist at the Opportunity Center. "Our motto is 'Every young person is prepared for future success.' They all want to succeed and have a better life. They want to be productive citizens."

Since November 2022, when the Hazelwood School District community voted to pass the \$130 million zerotax-rate-change bond issue ballot measure Prop H, the Hazelwood School District has been working hard to make improvements around the district of which students, parents, staff, and the community can be proud.

From revitalized athletic fields to new and improved safety and security updates, the upgrades around the district have been well received.

"The improvements that Prop H have brought us have surpassed even what I was thinking would happen," said Dr. Lisa Strauther, building principal at Russell Elementary and proud East High alumnae. "We have not seen improvements like this in a very long time, and we're excited that every classroom has ClearTouch panels, that the exterior doors have been updated, and very excited about the playground equipment. We can't wait

to have additional security measures with our secure vestibules, and we can't thank the community enough for what they have done for our Cougar scholars and Hazelwood community."

The latest ongoing Prop H upgrades are happening at the elementary school playgrounds, where playground

equipment and surfaces are being replaced and improved. Among the most exciting improvements is ensuring the playgrounds are ADA accessible.



which provides access for students with physical disabilities to utilize the equipment.

"We started with the most severe needs at Armstrong and Russell and are working down the list," explains David Dudley, HSD's Director of Maintenance. "All playground units should have a rubber surface installed under the playground unit in place of the certified

mulch, which was previously utilized. This work will take time to complete throughout the district, but we aim to do it as quickly

as possible."

"Armstrong is extremely excited about these updates to the playground," exclaimed Dr. Kelly Kozlen, building principal at Armstrong Elementary. "We

have not experienced these kinds of updates since the school's

inception in 1969, so we are excited to have safe and ADA-accessible playgrounds for our students."

"With these improvements to our playgrounds, Hazelwood School District will continue to ensure that our students can develop their social and emotional skills by being physically active on our safe, ADA-accessible playgrounds," said Dr. Nettie Collins-Hart,

Superintendent of Hazelwood School District. "I want to once again thank the community for their support of our

The I Define Me Movement Embodies Social And Emotional Learning At Southeast Middle

One of the many goals of Southeast Middle's Mindset Mondays is to focus on enhancing students' social and emotional learning. This integral program brings community partners, such as the I Define Me Movement, into the school to work with students on developing these skills.

The school-based program instills the value of self-esteem, diversity, leadership, and character-building skills in students through social-emotional learning components, restorative justice, and mentoring wellness programming.

"I Define Me has taught me how to be comfortable with myself and not follow others," expressed Southeast Middle sixth-grade student Dakota Weaver. "It is important to have friends you can talk to and not be shy and express your emotions."

For 31 Mondays, the I Define Me Movement works with sixth through eighth-grade girls. Weekly therapeutic support circles allow students to discuss social and emotional issues in a safe space where mentoring wellness and tools to address trauma are focal points.

"When you see students come into the classroom and they take our I Define Me pledge, they are pledging to be a better version of themselves," said I Define Me Movement Founder Tracie Berry-Mcghee. Schmidt won the award through nominations and recommendation letters from her colleagues and principal at Northwest Middle.


