Three Hazelwood Students Receive Drum Major Scholarships

The Hazelwood School District is celebrating three seniors, Jolaade Bada of Central High, Celina Bryant of East High, and Jaylen Stokes of West High, who are recipients of the Drum Major Scholarship through the Christian Hospital Foundation and Center for Advanced Professional Studies (CAPS) program. They received their recognition at the 9th annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration Luncheon at Christian Hospital in St. Louis.

The Drum Major Scholarship is awarded each year to CAPS students who plan to pursue a career in healthcare. With three distinct career pathways, each student shared their feelings about receiving the \$1,000 scholarship.

Jaylen, who has an interest in psychiatry, was shocked about being nominated. He explained, "Honestly, this surprised me. I never found myself as the so-called best or hardest working student because I felt there was always someone who could push themselves further than me." Jaylen added, "Having that opportunity taught me that maybe I can do this and not to give up. It taught me to stop thinking of myself as lower than others. I am grateful I was given the opportunity."

West High School counselor Marie Boesch nominated Jaylen because of his drive, motivation, and passion for what he is involved in. She stated, "Jaylen takes joy in what he is doing day to day, appreciates it as we have it; his compassion and empathy combined with his joy will help him be successful at making a difference in other people's lives." Jolaade, the youngest of three children in her family — and the only girl —faced challenges of her own, but believed in herself enough to overcome her fear of failure.

"It felt like the odds were always against me, and I constantly had something to prove growing up in an immigrant household as the youngest girl," Jolaade explained. "Receiving the Drum Major Scholarship has inspired me to continue showcasing the qualities MLK left in his legacy while pushing new boundaries in the healthcare industry. Now I know that I can channel those emotions into something greater. I hope to become someone who always surprises people pleasantly and to gain more recognition in my career as a dermatologist."

Passionate about working with animals, Celina, who wants to be a wildlife veterinarian, was in disbelief when she heard she had been awarded the Drum Major scholarship.

"I truly could not believe it for a second because this was the first scholarship I had received and I was picked for it," Celina exclaimed. "I did not apply for this scholarship which made receiving it feel unreal. Once I found out it was true, I was honored. This scholarship helps me to believe that regardless if you are not the perfect student, anything is possible by believing in yourself."

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West High culinary arts students Brandon Borders, Noah Jackson, Cylus Ward, and Tamia Coleman-Hawkins demonstrated their dessert skills at the Missouri Restaurant Association's Inaugural Ball in January at Rose of the Hill by Favazza's in St. Louis. With a 250-member plus guest list, the students produced an extravagant array of desserts including French eclairs with an orange mascarpone filling, chocolate ganache, and a candied cranberry-orange relish.

"Our culinary instructor, Ms. Aubuchon, chose students for this event who wanted to further their education in culinary arts and who saw had a big following to the craft," Borders explained. "I have been cooking since age six and have been more interested in baking over the last six years." Borders added, "I was born in Louisiana, and we are big seafood and pastry fans. With my experience, I wanted to step up with something fun and extravagant from the last time or last event, and we agreed on eclairs."



Throughout two Saturdays, West High's culinary students dedicated time to creating and perfecting



their desserts before the inaugural ball. Everything came down to time and the constraints of prepping for a large crowd.

"We had some hiccups at first," Jackson noted. "One of the main issues we had was initially, the dough became very runny when it was squeezed down on the trays and flattened too much while in the



oven. We had to run a couple of batches." Jackson added, "We all worked together the entire time. We all had our roles. Since my Culinary 3 class experience, I have worked numerous big catering events and felt confident about perfecting our eclairs after the batches were solidified."

"The greatest reward from this experience is that the networking we have done establishes a foundation for future businesses and projects we can pursue collectively and as

individuals," Borders concluded.

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Central High Senior Earns Outstanding Score of 31 on ACT

Hazelwood Central High senior Julianna Busse has something to celebrate after earning a score of 31 on the ACT.

The ACT, or American College Test, is an entrance exam used by most colleges and universities to help with admission decisions. With the highest possible score being 36, Busse has accomplished an impressive feat.

"My parents have always told me, 'school is your job." Growing up, this didn't make sense because no one pays you for going to school, so what's the point? Now that I'm older, I know better. Due to my test scores, I've received hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarship money," Julianna said.

Julianna spent a lot of time preparing for the exam, including studying over the summer break. Her mother, Michelle Busse, said she was so happy to see her daughter get the score she not only earned, but deserves, having done so much prep and taking her education seriously.

"Our reaction was of true excitement," her mother said. "She studied every single day without fail."

Julianna plans to study musical theatre, which she said is a much more rigorous major than it gets credit for. With the majority of the scholarships she applied to requiring an ACT score above 30, Julianna's score presents the option to look at schools both in Missouri and out of state.

"When doing theatre, you do everything from dissecting complex literature to learning how to program lightboards. My ACT score shows programs that I can both analyze Shakespeare and figure out the technical elements of theatre," she said.

Central High principal, Dr. Veronica Macklin, stressed the importance of ACT scores, especially with current efforts to get rid of diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives.

"Due to the ongoing dismantling of DEI initiatives, African American students are facing unique challenges and systemic inequalities that will affect their access to educational resources and opportunities," Dr. Macklin said. "In this context, performing well on tests like the ACT becomes even



more critical, as it provides a tangible way to overcome some of these barriers."

"Success on the ACT can demonstrate resilience and academic strength, offering African American students a path toward higher education and helping them level the playing field in a competitive college admissions process."

"Ultimately, it's about ensuring that African American students continue to have access to the resources and opportunities that support their success, both in the classroom and in the broader landscape of college admissions," Dr. Macklin said. "By taking the ACT, students are asserting their ability to take control of their academic future and pursue their goals, despite the challenges they may face."

Julianna views her success on the ACT as a hard earned freedom to follow her passions and take control of her future.

"School is your job' translates to 'studying buys you freedom.' The freedom to do whatever you want: leave Missouri, stay in Missouri, go to college, go to the military, anything," she said. "And sure, as people of color, society will always try to keep us boxed in and discredit our accomplishments, but test scores never lie."

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Students from Central High delivered an impressive presentation on their greenhouse project, showcasing the innovative ways they plan to create sustainable, eco-friendly resources and environmental awareness in North County. Their hard work and dedication highlight the importance of engaging with our planet's future while meeting the community's needs.

Jaelyn Williams, a ninth-grade Central High student, talked about the greenhouse project's influence on her peers.

"I feel the greenhouse project could positively affect Central High. It can influence kids to do better with eating choices and responsibility; a lot of responsibility comes with maintaining a greenhouse."

Adding to that sentiment, ninth-grade student, Teckoh Dotou, emphasized who would benefit the most from the greenhouse.

"The greenhouse will help the cafeteria and science teachers to educate about animals and plants," Dotou explained. "It will help students learn something they might not have had to learn. Students having trouble learning about aquaponics will have a teacher who can speak fluidly about aquaponics and introduce those careers to students."

Led by the St. Louis Zoo, the University of Missouri St. Louis, and Central High School, the Greenhouse Project has provided students with opportunities for research, surveys, and focus groups. It is a Real-World Friday experience: Students embark on multiple field trips to collaborate with professionals, gaining insight into the need for greenhouses and the effort required to maintain them.

"In the heart of a community where fresh food is a distant dream, a group of high school students is planting the seeds of change," Central High teacher, Shene Redden, expressed. "With determination and vision, they are building a greenhouse

that will not only grow food but cultivate hope, resilience, and a future where no one has to go hungry."

As students embark on this greenhouse project, the concept-tocompletion journey provides autonomy for students to dive deep and collaborate with district administrators, steering them on a successful path.

"The Growing the Zoo Perspective class is built around a co-design process, giving students an equal say in every decision regarding the greenhouse," St. Louis Zoo WildCare Park educator Emily Garrett explained. "For the focus group, students teamed up to create questions based on everything they'd learned and researched throughout the semester. They took the lead in discussions with administrators to ensure the greenhouse would meet its users' needs while sharing their ideas and getting district leaders excited about the project."

The District is excited about what Central High's greenhouse project will bring. This project empowers students to attain real-world skills and a sense of ownership while making a lasting impact on their school and community. It is a shining example of the types of programs highlighted at Central High during

Real World Fridays.

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Rising to the Top: Garrett Elementary Exemplifies Excellence!

At Garrett Elementary School, academic excellence isn't just a goal, it's a reality. In 2024, Garrett ranked in the top 13% of all Missouri elementary, middle, and high schools that receive academic Annual Performance Report (APR) points! The APR is a percentage-based report that measures how well schools serve students and families. They are calculated using the Missouri School Improvement Plan (MSIP). The APR takes several factors into consideration to create scores, including student performance, college and career readiness, and attendance rate.

Garrett's latest achievement goes along with over a decade of excellence at the school, including multiple Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) awards, two state recognitions for being an exemplary school, and a Professional Learning Community (PLC) awards from Solution Tree (where Garrett was one of only 200 schools selected throughout North America).

Garrett principal, Dr. Rachael Younge, attributes the excellent APR score to the school's commitment to student success. "Garrett's high

scores are a testament to our commitment to providing all students with the opportunities they need to succeed, using any means necessary," she said. "This includes many ways of intervening and enriching instruction that supports individual student needs. My teachers and specialists are skilled at utilizing formative and summative data to guide instruction while ensuring focused pathways for implementing standards-based lessons."

Even though the APR achievement is impressive, Dr. Younge noted that Garrett isn't stopping there. She has a plan in place to keep the momentum going. "My top priority is to maintain a learning environment that fosters growth and success." She continued, "This includes cultivating strong adult-child relationships that support motivation, promote well-being, and create opportunities for



achievement. I will continue to explore and apply best practices and strategies that are tailored to meet the needs of our student population." She added, "What we've accomplished so far serves as the foundation for the momentum we'll continue to build. Our goal is not to change what we do, but to enhance how we do it."

Congratulations to Garrett Elementary students and staff on this extraordinary achievement. We expect to hear more good news coming from the school in the future.

As we approached 2005 serving 22,000 students, we tracked the needs of the district's increased needs for new and updated facilities. I served as a committee member to undertake and implement a public bond campaign to secure \$250M to address those needs. 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Every Minute Matters: Why Attendance Sets the Stage for Success

With so much going on in our students' school days, it's sometimes easy to forget a key for success: attendance. Simply being present — and on time — is a large part of achieving success.

With state testing approaching here in the Hazelwood School District, it's a great time to remind parents and staff why school attendance and punctuality are so important and why even arriving a few minutes early can make a big difference.

- 1. Engagement and participation: Missing class time, or being late, can translate to missing valuable instruction and participation. Because many lessons are built on previous ones, arriving on time can consistently ensure that our students don't miss out on important lessons, and it allows them to stay engaged in learning.
- 2. Improved scores: It's only natural (and studies bear out) that students who attend classes regularly and on time tend to perform better academically than those who are inconsistent in attendance. Those students who spend more time in the classroom have access to more instructional time and are better prepared.
- **3. Consistency**: Consistent attendance and promptness are key to establishing a routine, which in turn helps to develop time management skills and discipline skills that are not only valuable in school, but beyond the classroom.
- 4. It all adds up: Arriving five minutes late or leaving five minutes early (for instance, picking up a student early to avoid the car line) can add up and make a big difference overall. For example, if a student were to arrive five minutes late every day, that would equal to 25 minutes of missed school time for the week and nearly two hours over the course of a month. It may not seem like a big deal daily, but when it adds up, it leads to a big amount of school time that is missed or disrupted.

In conclusion, attendance is an undeniable factor in student success. Making attendance and punctuality a priority will pave the way, not only for academic achievements, but will give students the best opportunity to thrive.

Be the Best on the Test — with Saturday State Test Prep Sessions!

With state test season rapidly approaching, students and parents looking to get that extra edge have a golden opportunity with the upcoming Saturday State Test Prep sessions.

HSD students will take the Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) and End-of-Course (EOC) tests starting in April throughout the district. These all-important tests can increase student scholarship opportunities, bolster confidence, and create a culture of high achievement. To get students prepared and support our mission to *Be the Best on the Test*, the district is hosting Saturday State Prep Sessions. These virtual sessions are open to all HSD students in grades 3-8 and will be held via Google Meet.

Students will focus on test-taking strategies and skills. At the center of these sessions will be a review of key skills and concepts being assessed on the MAP and EOC tests.



Be a Hero and Help HSD Students Fall in Love with Reading

Just thirty minutes a week spent reading with a Hazelwood School District student can make a

profound impact on the HSD students' love for reading.

Hazelwood Heroes trainer, Anjanette Clark, said HSD Hero Readers have been active in the school district for over 20 years, and they volunteer to read to and with students one-on-one for 30 minutes weekly.

"The student, chosen by the staff at the school, is generally one who struggles with reading or struggles to enjoy reading," Clark said.

The program is designed to enhance reading comprehension and encourage a love for reading in HSD students, and new volunteers are always welcome to become Reading Heroes.

Volunteers can choose which HSD elementary school they would like to visit, and no prior experience is necessary. All heroes will be provided with the training, materials, books, and activities by the HSD Heroes program. Each volunteer also must have a completed background check.

Schedules for the volunteers are flexible, as Clark asks the volunteers for their preferred time, and the school then finds a student that is available and that can use the extra attention weekly.

While volunteers are only asked to dedicate 30 minutes of their week to reading with an HSD student, Clark said some volunteers elect to work with multiple students, spending hours volunteering at their chosen school site.

Clark said the HSD Heroes meet every six to eight weeks to refresh their supplies and to get trained on another strategy to share with their students.

The schools are asked to find a student and a quiet place for the reader and student to interact, with some schools providing a classroom or a quiet space in the library.


