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
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
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Greetings HSD Community,

Project-based learning with open studio exploration will inspire students and introduce new art practices. This will also foster experimental and supportive environments for the artists' varying skill levels or backgrounds.

West High's Tamia Coleman-Hawkins Turns Her Entrepreneurial Ventures Into A Children's Book

"In 3rd grade, I took an economics class at Galactic, and my first-grade teacher, Mrs. Jennifer Kastner, was the one who recommended me for the Galactic program," Tamia explained. "I would be nowhere near where I am right now if she hadn't taken that first step in getting me there."

That economics class sparked Tamia's interest in owning her own business, which led to her writing her first children's book based on her story of being an 8-year old entrepreneur who reached beyond the stars.

"Mia Dreams BIGGER" was released on September 1, 2023, and the message that she and her mom, Tamishio Hawkins, who co-authored the book, wanted to get across was you're never too young to follow your dreams. "You don't have to wait until you're an adult to follow your dreams," Tamia said. "We say, 'shoot past the stars,' because when people say 'the skies are the limit,' I feel that is limiting. So, if you shoot past the stars, there is a whole universe out there that you can explore."

Tamia has done just that in her young entrepreneurial career, which started in 2015 when she and her mom created Mia's Treats Delight, a bakery business featuring brownies, cookie cakes, and her famous gourmet cookies.

Southeast Middle Continues To Motivate Students Through Mindset Mondays

Southeast Middle School became a thematic school for the 2023-2024 school year and has had a successful beginning of the school year.

The concept includes a vocational and career technical education (CTE) theme with a five-day extended school week for students and a four-day, Tuesday - Friday, workweek for teachers with only 11 working Mondays. Additional programming on Mondays for students is provided by community partners, with Southeast Middle teachers providing support to engage students. These Mondays are called Mindset Mondays and are a student favorite.

"Students have really enjoyed Mindset Mondays," said building principal Marsha Wallace. "This gives them an opportunity to learn about engaging things not normally taught in the traditional classroom setting." During Mindset Mondays, students are exposed to enrichment opportunities, social-emotional learning, and academic interventions. Community partners and vendors lead various activities with the help of faculty and staff to engage students.

This thematic school aims to create a school that educates the whole child intellectually, socially, and emotionally. Instruction focuses on academic growth, career technical education, and goal setting. We look forward to continuing the positive momentum at Southeast Middle!





Southeast Middle Introduces Urban Farming To Students

Southeast Middle, HSD's newest thematic school, is introducing its student population to urban farming through class instruction and hands-on training with urban farmer Mitchell Pearson, Phi Global Farms owner.

"At Southeast Middle, we are doing a hands-on approach to learning where agriculture is that fuel for the students," said Pearson. "Agriculture covers so many aspects of life. The nutritional component of agriculture is a part of the curriculum for students to learn about meat processing, fiber, and different types of food canning."

Currently, students are learning about compost and fish emulsions and fruits and vegetables associated with seasons.

"With the renewed interest in exploration by the students here at Southeast Middle, having Farmer Mitch here teach our students agricultural education that prepares them with basic survival skills and self-sustainability is especially exciting," said building principal Marsha Wallace. "The use of agriculture will introduce our students to various career opportunities through hands-on experience with farming, an industry not necessarily promoted in high school or higher education."

Throughout the school year, Pearson will teach students all aspects of urban farming, beginning with a garden on the school's property that currently houses collard greens, cabbage, and brussels sprouts.



Students will grow pickles later on in the school year.

"Food is medicine," said Pearson. "The faster you get it from the plant to your tummy, the better you will be. I want students to become lifelong learners who participate in their communities with the knowledge of how the process of food works."

The Hazelwood School District is excited about urban farming with an emphasis on nutrition education being offered to students at Southeast Middle.

HSD Hosts District's First Night Football Games At All Three High Schools

The excitement at all three HSD high schools was high as students, families, and the community packed the stands for the district's first night football games at West, Central, and East High.

All three games centered around big events, with West High celebrating homecoming weekend, Central High celebrating senior night, and East High hosting a Class 5 District 3 state playoff night game. HSD's Superintendent Dr. Nettie Collins-Hart attended the games along with members of her administrative team and the Board of Education.

"I want to thank the community for making these events possible and memorable for everyone involved," Dr. Collins-Hart said. "The Hazelwood School District is committed to helping our students become global citizens, which requires global skills, knowledge, and perspectives," said Haywood-Gaskin. "Second language learning is foundational to being a global citizen. Research shows that the most successful conditions for learning a second language are to start in the child's early years when the acquisition of words and pronunciation is natural. HSD is a premier school district in Missouri, and we are leading this effort in St. Louis County."

Whether walking the hallways, entering classrooms, or sitting in the dining halls, you will hear students speaking Spanish throughout Jamestown Elementary. Students enthusiastically volunteer to recite the Pledge of Allegiance during morning announcements.

"They ask if they can go to the office and present the Pledge of Allegiance in Spanish," said Spanish teacher Eleanor Trujiillo-

Tiroch. "It has helped with the morale of some of the students. It is a new type of learning, and some students who may not have felt strong in other areas now get a chance to shine in a new thing."



"What I like about the Spanish program is that we are learning a different language, and we can use that in everyday life," said fifth-grader Kenyon Davidson.

Jamestown will continue the effort to provide opportunities for all students to have early exposure to second language learning.

HSD Gamers Faceoff For The Second Year Of Esports

The Hazelwood School District is in its second year of electronic sports, commonly known as esports. Unlike traditional sports requiring physical activity, esports are indemand competitive video games, usually played by teams. Esports command critical thinking skills, communication, and teamwork. While esports may look like all fun and video games, East High esports head coach Charles Brown says it takes a lot of hard work.

"Esports encompasses different games that are competitive, sports, and puzzle-related," said Coach Brown. "Some people believe that video games make you lazy, but that is far from the truth in this program. Students learn companionship, sportsmanship, communication, and awareness to be a part of a bigger ecosphere of games presented to the masses. Once students come into the class, there is no downtime. We practice immediately and begin matches. We are all dedicated and focused on the different aspects of gaming."

Introduced in 2022, HSD is successfully growing each high school's esports program, which is also open for middle school students to participate at their corridor high schools. The number of players varies across three seasons: fall, winter, and spring. Each esports program has about 40 students, one head coach, and one assistant coach. Multiple



teams of varsity and junior varsity players compete against other players in schools throughout Missouri. The Missouri Scholastic Esports Federation (MOSEF) organizes all match schedules.

"I think the overall objective of MOSEF and our



programs is to teach students positive, healthy, and inclusive gaming behaviors," said the West High assistant coach Monica Licklider.

For students who want to be involved in esports but do not play video games, there are career and technical education challenges where students voluntarily come to class during esports practice time and learn and practice skills in graphic design, shout casting, video editing, health and wellness, and more. Students can work to improve streaming, redesigning and creating some alternative cyberart, and focusing on more technical aspects.

The popularity of esports continues to open doors to monetary prizes, college-level scholarships, and various career opportunities.

"Esports has made such a positive impact on students," said Licklider. "They have found a sense of community and formed friendships with new people. Students have learned to improve their communication skills and work as a team. Others are discovering new careers they did not know about through esports."

MOSEF has created a new Star Division for students with disabilities that affect gaming. HSD also plans to expand the esports program to that division.

Districtwide Competitions Add To The Fun At HSD's Fall Family Festival

The Hazelwood School District is excited to announce that Brown Elementary School, North Middle School, and East High School have been crowned HSD Family and Community Involvement Challenge champions! Thank you to all community members and vendors for their participation in the Fall Family Festival! Students engaged in various activities, including temporary tattoos, games, and a light dinner.



In February 2023, the Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSHSAA) partnered with RefReps to address the officials shortage and ballooning age of officials. RefReps has created an all-digital, turnkey curriculum that is flexible in its implementation to assist with this issue, and HSD immediately took an interest and piloted the class in the spring semester.

The district's first sports officiating class was offered at West High, with seven students completing the course. Jordyn Askew and Jiyu Zhang, current seniors at West High, have since completed their certification to become MSHSAA officials in volleyball.


"I was excited to hear that HSD was offering the sports officiating class because it provided me with the opportunity to strive beyond being an athlete," Jiyu exclaimed. "I was excited to get my officiate license in volleyball, a sport which I've enjoyed watching and playing non-competitively since middle school! I've gained new knowledge about volleyball that I didn't previously have. After completing the course and testing, I am proud to say that I am licensed to start officiating!"

The sports officiating class is offered districtwide, with ten students enrolled at Central High and seven at East High this fall. West High's course will take place in the spring.

Students who complete the program have the opportunity to officiate sporting events at the middle and elementary school levels. After graduating high school, they can officiate high school games once they pass the test to become MSHSAA certified.

"The sports officiating program, one of our number of real-world courses, ensures our students are engaged and empowered to lead their educational journey," Dr. Rhonda Key, HSD's Assistant Superintendent of High School Education, explained. "We are proud to offer this opportunity to our high school students."

Hazelwood Teacher In Residency Program Grows Exponentially In Its Second Year

The Hazelwood School District Teacher in Residency program is in its second year, growing from four participants in its first year to 26 participants this year.

"Hazelwood School District is at the forefront of innovation in the field of recruitment, and this initiative is making a positive impact on both students and teachers in various ways," said Teacher in Residency Mentor and Recruitment Coach Michelle Prather. "We have established a robust partnership with UMSL, and we aspire to expand this program."

The Teacher in Residency program is an alternative route to teacher certification through a partnership with HSD and the University of Missouri-St. Louis (UMSL). This program is for teacher certification candidates who wish to teach and become certified simultaneously. Teacher candidates must have earned a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university.

The candidate will have a transcript review by the University of Missouri St. Louis, be accepted for admission to UMSL, pass the Missouri Content Assessment (MOCA), obtain provisional certification from the Department of Elementary Secondary Education (DESE), secure a teacher of record position with Hazelwood, and obtain initial teacher certification and Department of Labor (DOL) Certification at the end of two years.



UMSL will provide the necessary coursework to earn teacher certification within two years. HSD teachers receive support from the building's instructional coach, a peer mentor, the Teacher in Residency Mentor, and a recruitment coach. This layered support system assists new teachers in the profession.

"I love the opportunity of this program for individuals who have a bachelor's but not in the education field, along with the chance to earn your master's as well," said kindergarten teacher Sarah Fantroy.

The Hazelwood School District is excited about the growth within the Teacher in Residency program and encourages all participants to continue raising their voices for HSD!

Meet the 2023-2024 Superintendent's Student Advisory Council

The Superintendent's Student Advisory Council is comprised of student leaders from each HSD high school and the Opportunity Center. Through this council, students meet with Superintendent Dr. Collins-Hart and other district leaders to use their voices for change and solution-finding.

Hazelwood School District Renews Focus On Middle School Athletics

The Hazelwood School District continues its focus on educating the whole child, and studies show that students participating in athletics or after-school activities show an increase in school attendance and academic performance.

"With the introduction of football this year, we have noticed a renewed interest in their attendance and academic standing," Dr. Randolph Helms, HSD's Middle School Athletic Director, noted. "Some students, who usually would struggle through the day, are putting their best effort forward at school. Our students here at the middle school level are craving to be a part of the school, and when the students have something they enjoy, they will continue to work to keep that enjoyment."

HSD has offered middle school volleyball, soccer, basketball, and track and field in previous years, but this year, they have expanded. The district is excited to also offer football, wrestling, baseball, softball, and esports at the middle school level.


Girls' volleyball and softball are featured in the fall, along with boys' soccer and football. Both boys' and girls' basketball and wrestling are being offered as winter sports, while boys' and girls' track and field, girls' soccer, boys' baseball, and esports will be spring sports.

"Football has generated the most interest in our middle school offerings. It has been a long time coming," Dr. Helms exclaims. "North County was a hotbed for football in the 1980s, '90s, and 2000s. Hazelwood Central won football state championships in 1985, 1996, 2008, and 2009; Hazelwood East won in 1989, 1995, and 2008. Many believe that introducing these sports at the middle school level prepares our students for future success. If you come to our games, the excitement and enthusiasm for our students and their efforts are on display. Our parents and grandparents show up in masses and support our students' efforts."

The softball, baseball, and football programs are currently playing interdistrict games, while volleyball, soccer, basketball, and track have expanded to games outside of HSD teams. The middle school athletic departments aspire to play all sports outside the district in future years.

"HSD's middle school programs have been enthusiastically received by our parents," Dr. Helms details. "Personally, I have enjoyed seeing a program like soccer grow because we have had students who have not typically played sports join the team and discover that they enjoy the sport. It is exciting and beneficial because the more involved students are at the middle school level, the more they will try out and compete at the high school level."

The Hazelwood School District is excited to see the growth of athletics throughout the district and looks forward to hearing students, parents, and staff raising their voices in support of their school's teams!





McCurdy's Brody Devenbaugh Surpasses \$3000 Raised For Kids With Cancer In Year 3 of the Great Cycle Challenge

Brody Devenbaugh is your typical 4thgrade student who has a wide variety of hobbies. His favorite is biking, which he has turned into a way to raise money for childhood cancer.

Cancer is the top disease-related cause of death for children and teens in the United States.

Each September, Brody, a student at McCurdy Elementary, participates in the Great Cycle Challenge, and in three years, he has surpassed \$3,000 raised, and pedaled over 250 miles. The challenge, benefiting the Children's Cancer Research Fund, is for people of all ages and abilities, with participants setting a personal riding goal and challenging themselves to pedal to fight kids' cancer.

"Brody has demonstrated a commitment to give back to assist others," Dr. Germaine Stewart, building principal at McCurdy Elementary, said. "Brody is an excellent example of how students can have a positive impact on their community!"

"I started riding because my cousin Bailey died of cancer, and I just think it's wrong how kids have to go through cancer,"

Each week, one classroom receives the school's traveling attendance trophy for having the best overall attendance percentage at McNair.

"The traveling trophy adds friendly competition to our building and helps motivate student attendance," Dr. Perano explains. "Each Monday, the new attendance winners are announced, and that classroom walks to the previous winner's classroom to claim the trophy. Students are so excited to pick it up and proudly display the trophy in their room."




#TeacherProud Tuesday is a regional initiative that celebrates those currently serving in the profession, and Mr. Winstral is a shining example of who HSD wants to commend.

The Tutoring and Social/Emotional Support Line is a resource for tutoring, homework help, and access to general social/emotional needs.


