


The first season took place in the 2021-2022 school year and had three schools participate: Jamestown, Keeven, and Walker Elementary. Keeven won the boys' division, while Jamestown won the girls' division. The league has doubled in the 2022-2023 school year with Barrington, Brown, and McNair joining the league.

“The partnership between HSD and PAL has benefited students, parents, PTA members from the schools, and stakeholders in the community,” Michael Thomas, assistant principal at Keeven exclaimed. “HSD and PAL have worked together with parents, staff, and the community to build coalitions and capacity. This partnership has allowed HSD to address Goal #5 in HSD’s strategic plan (Increase Parent and Community Involvement), while also addressing Goal #1 of the plan (Improve Student Achievement).”

“We are excited to have our younger students participating in athletics,” said Dr. Nettie Collins-Hart, Hazelwood School District Superintendent. “This partnership allows our students the opportunity to be competitive and sets them up to be successful student-athletes in middle and high school.”

The basketball program is a six-week program followed by a week of playoffs. All equipment, uniforms, league registration, and insurance fees are paid for by PAL. The league has also reached out to HSD high schools to present volunteer opportunities for high school students who are in need of community service hours.

George “Rocky” Mason III Scholarship Program Gives Back to HSD




St. Louis County Prosecuting Attorney, Wesley Bell, Presents a Lesson in Black History to East Social Studies Department

St. Louis County Prosecutor and East High alumnus, Wesley Bell, led a symposium discussing the American social contract, criminal justice, policing, mental health, and social injustices in the black community to East High government and social studies students. Captain Clay Farmer, St. Louis County Prosecuting Attorney's Office Head of Security, was a part of the panel.



"It is truly an honor to return to the same place where I grew up. It is not about giving back. To me, it's about giving what I owe because many people poured into me," said Bell. "I am hoping I can inspire students the way others inspired me. Education is the greatest equalizer and truest path when discussing careers and generational wealth." East High sophomore, Jayden Glasby, was very impressed with the presentation. "He said a lot of critical things for the youth of this school today to consider," said Glasby. "He was so open about what he does in his office. That filtration with students and people younger than him is very meaningful. It helps a lot."

The *No Guns in School* campaign specifically targets guns and mobilizes students, parents, and the community to partner with the district to achieve one goal - *No Guns in School*. **Did you know that a student who brings a gun to school will be suspended for up to 180 days? Additionally, barring extenuating circumstances, the student will be expelled, which means they will not be able to attend any public school in the state of Missouri.**

The key to achieving the campaign goal is participation from all stakeholders. The information below explains specific ways each stakeholder group can support the campaign.

Students

- Do not bring guns to school.
- If you become aware of anything that threatens the safety of our learning community, immediately alert an administrator or file a report through the anonymous HSD Safety Tip Line (314-281-4584, tipline@hazelwoodschoools.org).
- Hold your peers accountable by reminding them about the consequences of bringing a gun to school.
- Promote the campaign amongst your peers.

Parents

- Talk with your student about the importance of staying away from guns.
- Know what your student brings to school each day.
- If you become aware of anything that threatens the safety of our learning community, immediately alert an administrator or file a report through the anonymous HSD Safety Tip Line.
- Talk with other parents about the campaign.

District

- Conduct relationship-building activities involving students, Safety Officers, Safety Monitors, Administrators, Faculty, and Staff.
- Implement incentive programs for schools that do not have incidents related to guns.

Community

- Report school-aged children in our community who you suspect have a gun to the police or to the HSD Safety Tip Line.
- Gun owners should store guns in a locked case, safe, or cabinet away from children.



Larimore's School Nurse, Kathy Gutmann, Implements Asthma Challenge

Larimore's school nurse, Kathy Gutmann, has successfully implemented an asthma challenge at Larimore. This monthly challenge encourages students to pre-treat with an albuterol inhaler before PE or recess to decrease asthma symptoms associated with exercise.

The idea for the asthma challenge stemmed from the partnership with St. Louis Children's Hospital and the Healthy Kids Express Program. The two partnerships provided a guideline for more structured compliance with albuterol inhalers and asthma action plans.

When Gutmann noticed that she was not receiving consistent responses from students/teachers for the students to come into the office and pre-treat before PE and recess, she decided to try something new. Nurse Gutmann, an arts and crafts enthusiast, began a challenge to create a theme every month with a puzzle. Every time she pre-treats a student, they get a puzzle piece. If the students meet the requirement by the end of the month, there will be a celebration.

Each month the number of winners and students participating in the challenge has grown. Nurse Gutmann is excited about the impact of the asthma challenge at Larimore. "The students are learning about asthma. They are learning about their triggers and learning ways to prevent those symptoms," said Gutmann. "I am seeing reduced asthma attacks."


