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From the Desk of the Superintendent

After more than a year, Hazelwood School District students will begin returning to the classroom on March 29, 2021. The return of face-to-face instruction represents an exciting step toward the unique learning experience offered within HSD buildings.

Since March of 2020, the district has been evolving together to meet the academic, social/emotional, and health needs of our school community. From the teacher workgroups that created this year's revised curriculum to the staff members who have kept buildings operating, we have pulled together in the worst of times to support our students and each other. Our students have navigated a once-in-a-century pandemic, our parents have provided never-ending support, and our school community has shown an incredible level of strength, creativity, and compassion.

Despite the constraints of the pandemic, HSD has found safe ways to serve and celebrate. Throughout the school year, the district has held dozens of drivethru resource events that provided the community with food resources, school supplies, personal protective equipment, and a variety of crucial services. In February of 2021, the district held a virtual PTA Founders' Day celebration. The event gave the district a chance to celebrate the PTA, Teachers of the Year, and Support Staff of

the Year. The event also raised more than \$18,000 for the PTA Council Scholarship Fund, which benefits HSD high school seniors.

While we know that some students and faculty have struggled with virtual instruction, this experience has helped the district develop curriculum that will allow HSD to continue to offer virtual learning options, even when the pandemic is over. The district's ability to deliver virtual instruction will help prepare our students to operate in a world that relies more and more on virtual connections each day.

In addition to virtual learning, the district also revamped building and transportation safety procedures that will serve our school community well long after the pandemic is over. While each of us wishes we could erase the damage caused by the pandemic, I find comfort knowing that our school community has continued to put the needs of students first. I am looking forward to welcoming HSD students, faculty, and staff back to our school buildings. Thank you for all you do to promote our culture of high expectations and excellence!



HSD Launches Public Health Campaign

In the fall of 2020, Hazelwood School District launched the Help Hazelwood Get Healthy public health campaign. The campaign is aimed at encouraging everyone who lives in the area to wear masks, practice social distancing, and wash their hands. With a strategic focus on community engagement, the campaign started with a free drive-thru resource event at Hazelwood Central High School. HSD nursing staff distributed more than 5,000 Help Hazelwood Get Healthy resource kits to families. The kits included masks, thermometers, and COVID-19 information.

Additional campaign elements included public service announcement videos featuring students, billboards on each side of the district, and a Help Hazelwood Get Healthy contest for students and employees. Through the contest, the district collected videos, poems, and posters with healthy messages that will be shared throughout the school year on social media.

Two of the best submissions came from elementary school students Khamya and TaLiah. Khamya created a poster that encouraged people to defeat COVID-19. TaLiah created a video that explained the importance of hand sanitizer.

While the foundation of the campaign will continue to encourage people to wear masks, wash their hands, and practice social distancing, COVID-19 vaccine education will become a major focus.

"The district is committed to sharing accurate information about the vaccine with the community to help people make educated decisions," Dr. Nettie Collins-Hart, Superintendent of HSD said. "COVID-19 is a tough enemy, but we can defeat it together."

Three HSD Schools Selected to Participate in UMSL's Literacy Program

The University of Missouri – St. Louis (UMSL) recently received a \$5.1 million grant that will go toward improving literacy in select St. Louis-area schools. As part of the grant, three Hazelwood schools began working with UMSL in February to improve literacy – Grannemann Elementary School, Hazelwood East High School, and Hazelwood Southeast Middle School.

Literacy is crucial in a student's life and is essential for educational and social development. It not only empowers students in reading, writing, and communication skills, but it also enhances career opportunities in the future.

During the program, UMSL literacy experts will coach educators on culturally relevant practices associated with the science of reading, including phonics instruction, reading practices to develop fluency and the development of vocabulary, and a focus on improving comprehension. Participating schools will also be provided with literacy instruction resources.

HSD Educator & Parent Win NCCU Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Oratory Contest

Kolby Sharpe, a Townsend Elementary School teaching assistant, and Monique Hines-Smith, a Lusher Elementary School parent, were among the winners of the 2020 North County Churches Uniting for Racial Harmony and Justice (NCCU) Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Oratory Contest.

Sharpe and Hines-Smith wrote and presented original speeches that celebrated Dr. King's dream. Reflecting on Dr. King's quote, "Intelligence plus character - that is the goal of education," Sharpe's speech stated that history books should be revamped to reflect more positive and accurate information about Black people.

An HSD employee since January 2020 and in the educational field since 2001, Sharpe also wrote that she believes every school needs therapists, counselors, and psychologists to help with the development of intelligence and character.

"I am incredibly humbled that my work resonated with so many people," Sharpe said. "It is our duty to teach and raise our youth in a well-rounded manner."

Hines-Smith's speech stated that love, compassion, and truth are necessary to create a morally conscious generation that develops both intelligence and character.

"We can each do our part in preserving Dr. King's iconic legacy. I am honored and filled with pride to have been selected as one of the contest winners," Hines-Smith said. "I encourage my children to seek out new challenges, so participating in this contest was an excellent way to model that message."

Hazelwood Central High School Students Participate

in the Bake for Good Program

Through King Arthur Baking Company's Bake for Good outreach program, a Hazelwood Central High School teacher provided baking kits for 82 students to bake at home.

Sarah Sullins, who teaches family and consumer science, used the program to connect with students during virtual learning.

Each baking kit included flour, yeast, a recipe booklet, and a dough scraper. Sullins also provided measuring cups and spoons for students. With the baking kits, students learned how to make yeast dough, cinnamon rolls, pizza, dinner rolls, challah bread, garlic knots, butter braids, and pretzels.

"I'm proud of my students because they used this opportunity to challenge themselves and do something new and different," Sullins said. "Taking a class like this virtually has improved students' confidence, work ethic, and independence. They really enjoyed it and exceeded their own expectations." As part of the program, students are encouraged to share their homemade bread with a neighbor or first responder. However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, students shared their creations with their family.

"I enjoyed this lab a lot, and I'm glad I tried it," said David, a Hazelwood Central High School student. "This was my first time making bread, and it's been something I've wanted to try for a while."

A Message from the Board

In 2020, the Hazelwood School District Board of Education began to develop a vision for addressing long-standing race, equity, and inclusion issues in our learning community. Our region is no stranger to the pain caused by systemic racism and the destructive consequences of inaction. For too long, school districts have accepted the status quo of rampant inequity. From curriculum to discipline, the unique needs of minorities have been disregarded. With that in mind, the Board began the intentional work of creating a Statement of Solidarity.

The Statement of Solidarity was finalized in June of 2020. It includes concrete action steps aimed at creating an inclusive, equitable, and safe environment for all students. For the Board, this effort is personal. We have seen the tears, heard the cries, and felt the pain of our students.

In July of 2020, the district hosted an emotional student-led virtual panel that drove home the need for strategic and swift action. "Breaking the Silence: HSD Student Voices on Racial Justice and Equality" gave a diverse group of students a platform to share their experiences in HSD schools and the surrounding community. The topics included the role of

school resource officers and making the curriculum more inclusive. The Board listened, along with the rest of the HSD community, and learned vital information that will help inform future decisions.

Since the student-led panel, the Board has established a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Workgroup charged with creating the district's first policy on racial equity and inclusion. The goal is to create a policy that empowers the superintendent, faculty, and staff to do the work necessary to eradicate any traces of systemic racism and inequality in our learning community. Additional panels and community feedback opportunities will continue to play a key role in our efforts to operationalize the Statement of Solidarity.

For the Board, the ground-breaking Statement of Solidarity is much more than words in a document. It is the answer to a call to action to create positive change. The Statement of Solidarity will serve as a blueprint for our school district to make equity the norm in all HSD buildings and classrooms.
