

These are the areas in Missouri with the most COVID-19 cases among children



JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — School districts in Missouri are starting school as COVID-19 continues to be a concern across the St. Louis area. Some schools are requiring masks in classrooms, while other districts have allowed each family to make that decision.

According to Missouri's dashboard, the data reflects COVID-19 activity among all school-aged residents, including non-public school students, in each school district's geographical boundary. The data is for ages 5 to 19.

Cases reported by school districts may differ from the numbers below because not every child in the school's boundary is enrolled in a public school.

Here are the district boundaries with the most COVID-19 cases in the state of Missouri. Several St. Louis area districts are among the highest in the state. The following numbers are based on the most recent data, which began on Aug. 3 and ended Aug. 16, 2021.

Fort Zumwalt mom asks school district to enforce masking on school buses



ST. CHARLES COUNTY, Mo. (KMOV.com) -- A St. Charles County mom is pleading for her child's school to make students follow mask guidelines. The CDC says students should wear masks on buses, but this Fort Zumwalt mom says that's not happening.Leigh Kaufman says she has Graves Disease, an immune disorder, and that's one reason why her family including her 5th grade daughter is worried about COVID.

"She is a very caring child, she wants to see me healthy. One day she told me she wants to wear her mask to keep you and dad healthy," said Kaufman. Kaufman says other students aren't wearing their masks on buses in the Fort Zumwalt School District.

"Before she got on the school bus, she informed me about half of the students on the school bus were not wearing their masks on the school bus...with it being federally mandated, that was a little bit of a concern for me as a parent," said Kaufman. The district superintendent offered Leigh some reassurance that they are trying to follow the federal mandate.

"I think in the hot weather sometimes people take advantage of it, but we'll remind everybody so we get back on target," said Superintendent Dr. Bernard Dubray. It's something other districts admit they're struggling with. In Bourbon, Missouri, the Crawford County superintendent says it's too hot on the buses to wear masks.

News 4 checked with other districts and asked about masking on buses. Rockwood says if they have an issue they will work with each individual student and their parents to make sure the student complies. Parkway says it would address it with the bus driver first and then the student. The Hazelwood School District has had a mask mandate in place since last March and they say it's really not been an issue. Kaufman says she's grateful the district responded so quickly to her concern.

"The principal called me and that was a rather reassuring conversation. She let me know that they will be doing morning and afternoon announcements as a reminder for the kids and as well as talked to the bus drivers," she said. The federal mandate requiring masks on public transportation, including public school buses, was extended until Jan. 2022.

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NATIONAL COALITION AGAINST CENSORSHIP

NCAC JOINS LETTER CALLING ON ARKANSAS SUPERINTENDENT TO REPRINT CENSORED YEARBOOK PAGES

The National Coalition Against Censorship has signed on to a letter by the Student Press Law Center calling on the Superintendent of Arkansas's Bigelow High School to reprint yearbook pages that were censored after alleged "community backlash." The letter also asks that the Superintendent apologize to the yearbook staff and former adviser Meghan Walter who resigned due to the censorship.

The contested pages outlined world events that took place during the 2020-2021 academic year, including the 2020 election, the impact of COVID-19, the death of George Floyd, and more.

Student journalists have First Amendment rights that their schools cannot lawfully override. As the letter to the Superintendent states:

The U.S. Supreme Court set a "floor" for the legal protection of student journalism in its 1988 ruling, Hazelwood School District v. Kuhlmeier, and said that school officials have to demonstrate that their censorship is "reasonably related to legitimate pedagogical concerns." Although the Court did not specifically define every reason that could qualify as a "legitimate pedagogical concern," lower courts have clarified that schools may not use their authority over student publications to deny information to the public purely for purposes of public-relations image control.

We share the Student Press Law Center's concern over this display of censorship. We urge the school district to immediately reprint the yearbook spread and issue an apology to recognizing the rights of student journalists.
